

The Rank Foundation - Golden Awards - Grant Update



In April 2022 we were awarded a Golden Award for our project to enable young people to take the lead in establishing an organisation wide shift in culture and attitudes to ensure we have a positive environmental effect, and limit any negative impact.



The project began with two training sessions for our staff and volunteer teams, led by Lucy Allis, a Sustainability Projects Coordinator at WILD C.I.C. These sessions focused on raising awareness of our impact on the environment and looking at what action we might take to improve this. The training gave time for the team to think about the issues involved and made sure that everyone was onboard for the project.

Next, Project Wild came to SELFA to deliver sessions with the children and young people. These were tailored to

the ages and individual needs of the groups, including sessions for children with profound and multiple disabilities, to develop their undertanding of the environment and sustainability.



Our Youth Council decided that they would like to take the lead on the project. The facilitators from Project Wild worked with the group with a mix of discussion, practical activity and taught content across five sessions:

- Ecology 101 What is biodiversity and why does it matter?
- Sustainability Introduction to the broad concept of sustainability.
- Field Ecology Skills Exploring the wildlife in our area with practical field ecology skills.

 Sustainability on other Conduction of sustainability and other conductions.
- Sustainability on site Conducting a sustainability assessment of the SELFA premises.
- 5. Pulling it all together What do sustainability and environment have to do with each other?


